- 1. Rate the book from 1-5.
- 2. How does the island's tidal isolation influence choices and tension? Have you seen a setting (workplace, town, home) shape behavior in a similar way?
- 3. Do you read her aloneness as strength, avoidance, or both? When does solitude feel restorative vs. limiting?
- 4. How does a missing person drive the plot and other characters? Have you experienced someone's absence shaping a group or family dynamic?
- 5. In what ways does art in the novel reveal, distort, or protect the truth? Where do you think creative work should draw that line?
- 6. Which secrets feel justified, and which cross a moral line? What criteria do you use (in life or fiction) to decide when secrecy is acceptable?
- 7. How does the outsider from London shift the power balance on Eris? Have you seen a newcomer change the "rules" of a group?
- 8. Whose version of events did you trust most, and why? How do you weigh conflicting accounts when you don't have all the facts?
- 9. Where do you notice power—domestic, artistic, institutional—showing up in the story? Which scenes best expose the costs of that power?
- 10. What does starting over cost Grace (and/or Vanessa), and what does it offer? What makes a reinvention believable to you in fiction?
- 11. By the final pages, did you want truth, justice, or peace—and did the book deliver it? What alternative ending would you argue for?
